

Manitoba's Nocturnal Owl Survey 2008 Annual Report



Hundreds of volunteers have participated in the Manitoba Nocturnal Owl Survey since it began in 1991. Their effort allows the monitoring of owl populations in Manitoba

on a scale not possible by any other means. This newsletter serves as a medium to report back to participants with updated population statistics, bar charts, and line graphs. These 'products' are important aspects from a science and conservation perspective. But it is too easy to lose sight of the inspiring poetry of wild owls while fastidiously cataloging and examining survey data.

Not reported in this newsletter are the hundreds of written and verbal expressions of wonder and excitement by veteran and novice owl surveyors about their experiences while doing the surveys. These expressions are conveyed on data sheets, in emails and in phone messages.

The quest for a scientific understanding of past, present and future owl population dynamics is thankfully not at odds with a more aesthetic appreciation of the same phenomenon while standing on a road at night listening to the emotion-laden love song of the Great Horned Owl. In fact, both experiences compliment each other. In the words of Alan Moore, "... a more lyrical eye lending the cold data a romance from which it has been long divorced." (1986. Watchmen. D.C. Comics. New York.)

Equally important and under reported is the effect of the surveyor's cumulative product on others not directly involved. The results of the survey continue to support and inspire others to participate in various ways to help conserve owls, including ...

Manitoba Owl Activity Updates

- Initiation of graduate research on the breeding biology of the Barred Owl in Manitoba by Todd Whiklo in 2009.

- Start of graduate research on wild and captive breeding-released Burrowing Owls in southwestern Manitoba by Alex Froese in 2009.
- Completion of graduate research on Northern Sawwhet Owl migration at Delta Marsh, Manitoba by Chris De Ruyck.
- Completion of graduate research on Urban Eastern Screech Owl Ecology in Winnipeg, Manitoba by Christian Artuso.
- Sustaining the Canadian Owl, Bird Studies Canada (BSC). In 2007, Debbie Badzinski and Denis Lepage from BSC set up a data base and an associated on-line data entry system for the Manitoba owl survey. We will test it with a small number of surveyors in 2009, and hope to get as many of you to enter your survey data on line in 2010. This database will help us share our data with students and other researchers around the world.
- Alex Froese was contracted last year to enter owl survey data from 2000-2007 and did an outstanding job she is currently entering data from 1991-1999, and 2008, and has once again put in many extra hours organizing the data.
- An analysis showing high correlation of Northern Sawwhet Owl and small mammal prey data from Manitoba with that from Wisconsin presented at the 2007 World Owl Conference in Groningen, NL.
- Development of a global monitoring strategy for the Short-eared Owl with the Global Owl Project www.globalowlproje






